Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ--whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

Please bear with us as we complete the installation process, WiFi upgrade, conduit reconfiguration, PIN distribution and training for using the system. You may continue to use physical keys until notified to return them.

Automatically generated Personal PIN codes are being distributed by Tom Kelleher to everyone that previously had a key and reported it for the key log. If you would like to customize your PIN code you can contact Tom Kelleher.

All parishioners are eligible to get a personal PIN code to access the Parish Hall, please contact Tom Kelleher to set one up for you.

The Access Control System is programmable to have unlocked time periods, currently set for Sundays 7:45 am until 1pm. It also has "community group" unlock time windows for the Support Groups which meet in the mornings and are triggered by the "first in" of the Support Group leadership with codes.
